
January Reads 2021

Be a King

Explicitly linking elements of Dr. King's life with a call for individual activism, this book reminds us that, from loving one another to standing up for social justice, no voice is too small to make an impact. The illustrator intersperses beautiful watercolour illustrations of King's life with pictures of students engaging in a class project on social justice. Weatherford has said that she hopes her readers "understand that freedom was not free and that people of conscience must speak their minds and live their values." In this book she reminds us that those ideals can be lived out at every age, and in many ways, big and small.

Be Kind

This <u>beautifully simple</u>, <u>yet complex</u> book engages readers in questioning what it means to be kind. After a student is laughed at in the lunchroom, the narrator tries and fails to comfort her, then wonders, "What does it mean to be kind anyway?" The book imagines <u>different ways to be kind and empathetic</u>, from using people's names to sticking up for someone when others are unkind. <u>But it also acknowledges the fact that it's not always easy</u>, and can even be scary. <u>These days</u>, it seems more important than ever for books to show young people how to act with thoughtfulness, civility and kindness.

Everything is Beautiful, and I'm Not Afraid

This <u>lovely, biting, heartbreaking, charming semi-autobiographical</u> graphic novel explores the experiences of a queer, Chinese immigrant living in NYC, <u>balancing independence and tradition, freedom and family, honesty and acceptance.</u> The book includes selections from Xiao's monthly serial *Baopu* (<u>Autostraddle</u>) and new work, combining to create a thought-provoking essay on <u>what it's like to navigate the complexities of seeking belonging—mentally and geographically. Through it all is a <u>search for authenticity</u> and the result is at once <u>self-reflective, colourful, melancholic but uplifting.</u></u>

This <u>seminal picture book</u> about a young girl learning to love her hair was inspired by the author's own memories of her hair-combing ritual with her mom. Tarpley aimed <u>to create a whimsical story that encouraged kids not only to love their hair, but also to explore and find joy in their own imaginations. The <u>beautiful watercolor illustrations emphasize the loving family interactions and add to the warm feel of the story</u>. As they move out from the intimacy of her bedroom to the whole globe, the <u>pictures and text reflect the expanding horizons of the child's world as she learns to be proud of her distinctive hair and her heritage</u>.</u>



A deeply poignant look at love which tells a difficult truth: even those who are well loved will eventually learn that the world holds sadness and loss in addition to comfort and sweetness. Love is a constant on every page, but it is sometimes found in difficulty and trials. The result is a book that is lyrical and sensitive...likely to leave readers of all ages a little tremulous, and brimming with feeling. Long's artwork is, in his words, "a bit raw, a bit vulnerable, a bit messy...flawed here and beautiful there. Kind of like love itself." In the end, this book has the power to look into the darkness and still find stars twinkling overhead.

The Keeping Quilt



Patricia Polacco's recounting of her family's quilt has become a <u>beloved classic</u> in the thirty years since it was first published. When Anna outgrows the dress she wore to emigrate from Russia to America, her mother has an idea: They use a basket of old clothes, each item with a family member and story behind it to "make a quilt to help us always remember home. It will be like having the family in backhome Russia dance around us at night." In <u>strongly moving pictures that are as heartwarming as they are real</u>, Polacco tells the story of the quilt over four generations as it is loved and lived by a family whose traditions evolve with the times.

Those Shoes

This is a a heartfelt and realistic story about everyday struggles between wants and need and the power of friendship and sacrifice. Everyone at school has "those shoes" and Jeremy wants a pair too, but his family can't afford them. Jeremy tries to wear a too-small pair he finds at a thrift shop, but he eventually gifts them to a friend. What begins as a simple story about fitting in, ends up delivering powerful lessons about yearning and disappointment, kindness and compassion, and being grateful.

Tutto Storto (All Wrong)

Currently only available in Italian, *Tutto Storto* is a <u>daring new novel for young readers</u> <u>about the escape of two teenagers who want to get away from social and parental constraints</u>. The reader is immediately <u>catapulted</u> into Elisa's furious, <u>exuberant and vital</u> mind <u>like looking through a window into the adolescent experience: a ferment of desires, fears, problems and dreams</u>. But Elisa offers a new and unexpected perspective, <u>which describes the "other half" of children with disabilities, the experiences of their "invisible" siblings, and their jealousies. Like all good books, it manages to capture every reader, regardless of age.</u>
